- 1. Gather scraps
- 2. Lay down parchment paper, then Pellon Solvy, slightly smaller than the parchment paper.
- 3. Sprinkle a layer of scraps onto the Solvy. Cover with parchment paper. Press with a dry iron.
- 4. Remove the top layer of Parchment paper and set aside.
- 5. You will see holes in the sheet. Place more scraps over the holes. Use a glue stick to hold scraps in place if needed. Cover the whole area with Pellon "Ultra" or Super Solvy Water dissolvable stabilizer. Cover entire scrap area leaving about 1 inch of Solvy all around the outside edges. (Make sure parchment paper is under and/or over Solvy areas or it will stick to your iron.)
- 6. Sprinkle lightly with a water spray bottle. Just a light spritzing, misty spray. Cover with the other Parchment Paper sheet and iron on @WOOL SETTING until you don't see any wet spots left. Let cool for several minutes. Carefully peel off the parchment paper from both sides. You won't need pins to sew and stabilize the scraps.
- 7. Now, start in the middle and stitch about 1" to 3" apart. (I fill my bobbin with heavy thread and bobbin stitch from the back side with needle thread in a different color so I can see the stitches) I finish one direction out to the edge, then the other direction to the edge. Bobbin stitching is optional.
- 8. Then turn it over and stitch with colorful rayon machine embroidery thread in the other direction kind of following the heavy thread lines starting from the middle and working to each side. Make sure you stitch both directions. Note* if your machine complains about metallic thread, put it in the bobbin and stitch from the wrong side.
- 9. Wash away the Solvy by swishing in the sink. Now lay out flat on a towel to dry. You now have a scrappy layer of fabric. Use as desired.
- 10. If you don't want to leave holes (Confetti Cloth) use fusible interfacing or tulle. Don't forget the parchment paper when you iron the spritzed Solvy. Cool well and peel off the parchment before you stitch the Solvy sandwich. You still must stitch both ways or free motion all over it.
